Curriculum: The Essence of the Christian School

There are several very important factors that are involved in the work of the Christian school as it strives to accomplish its stated mission involving the education of our youth. For the Christian school to be effective in its work, it must have a solid commitment from the parents and good support from the community of believers. It must have teachers who are thoroughly grounded in the principles of Reformed education, skilled in the practice of teaching, and able to relate well with parents and students alike. It must have the facilities and the resources necessary to carry out the work that must be done. Finally, the most essential element of any educational institution is a curriculum designed to help the school meet its instructional goals for the students.

Curriculum is much more than just the subjects that are taught in the school. It is the content that is taught in those subjects and it is the learning

experiences that are used to teach that content as the student is led through a particular time span of their life. Through the curriculum they are led to become what we had envisioned for them to become at the end of that time. The Glossary of Education Reformed has this to say about curriculum;

"The term curriculum refers to the lessons and academic content taught in a school or in a specific course or program. In dictionaries, curriculum is often defined as the courses offered by a school, but it is rarely used in such a general sense in schools. Depending on how broadly educators define or employ the term, curriculum typically refers to the knowledge and skills students are expected to learn, which includes the learning standards or learning objectives they are expected to meet; the units and lessons that teachers teach; the assignments and projects given to students; the books, materials, videos, presentations, and readings used in a course; and the tests, assessments, and other methods used to evaluate student learning. An individual teacher's curriculum, for example, would be the specific learning standards, lessons, assignments, and materials used to organize and teach a particular course." (From the GLOSSARY OF EDUCATION REFORM https://www.edglossary.org/curriculum/)

More simply stated, curriculum might be thought of as the "floor plan" or "blueprint" for what is going to be taught, learned, and experienced in the school over a period of time. Whatever this period of time is, we hope that each student will be equipped with what they need and prepared for the next phase of their life. That might be moving from first grade to second grade, from 9th grade to 10th grade or from 12th grade to college/work/the home.

Every school has a vision of how they will shape and nurture each student to become the type of person that will be able to be best prepared to meet the challenges of life. The curriculum for a Christian school would certainly have that goal as well and will include aspects of a religious or spiritual nature that are to be a part of the formal instructional program.

Outside influences often impact the work of the school. The home, the church, friends, and even the influences of the world factor in. For a school to be effective in its work and to have accountability to

those who establish and maintain the school, there needs to be effort put into the development of and the guarding of the curriculum. If the school has determined that a particular class will have the goal of instructing the student in a particular topic but the teacher never gets to that topic or decides that they don't think that topic is important, there is going to be a problem. Although this needs to be the work of the entire faculty, it has to take direction from someone who is in a position to see the big picture. Someone has to be able to see how it all fits together. This is the work of a Director of Curriculum. Through work with the faculty and School Board, it involves the determination of specific goals and objectives for each class, the documentation of these into a visible format, and then the monitoring of the work to ensure that these things are being done. The curriculum can be adjusted and changed, but it should always be done through intentional movement from one position to another rather than just a randomly drifting away from the documented course to something else.

Director of Curriculum

The curriculum of a school is composed of many different parts, which are controlled by many different people. This makes keeping track of the curriculum a very difficult process. In light of the recent growth and the projected growth of our school in the years ahead, the Board of Covenant Christian High School recently made a decision to hire someone, on a parttime basis, to do the work of a Curriculum Director. Mr. Kyle Bruinooge, a member of our teaching staff since 2012, has been hired for this position. Beginning in September, Mr. Bruinooge will be teaching for three periods of the day and devoting a half day to this new work. The Board believes that this is an important position for our school. Some of the reasons for this were evident in the grounds that were stated to justify this position.

- 1. This would relieve the Administrator of a portion of his duties that will continue to grow as the school and staff grows.
- 2. School and staff growth has made management of the curriculum more difficult.
- 3. This would allow for dedicated attention to curriculum matters and greater follow through on needs and improvements.
- 4. This would allow for better coordination with feeder school curriculum.
- 5. It would ensure that spiritual principles are found in all courses taught at Covenant

Some of the more specific tasks of the Curriculum Director include the following:

- 1. Lead the Curriculum Committee which is made up of one teacher from each department.
- 2. Produce and maintain a Curriculum Guide that can be accessed by students and parents. This guide will give pertinent information on all the course offerings and all curriculum requirements.
- 3. Produce and maintain curriculum documentation for all courses.
- 4. Examine the content of all courses to ensure that important concepts that are in the documents are being taught and that there is no unnecessary overlap of content in multiple courses.
- 5. Make sure that foundational biblical principles are embedded into the work of each class.
- 6. Ensure that school-wide instructional goals are included in all classes.
- 7. Develop a process or pathway for curriculum change.



We look forward to having a dedicated professional working in this very important area of our school program. We believe that in time there will be much valuable information available to help parents and students better understand the educational program at Covenant Christian High School. We

pray for God's blessing upon Mr. Bruinooge and the work that he does for our school.

Recent Curriculum Changes

Over the past couple of years, the Curriculum Committee has recommended to the Education Committee and the Board several changes to our curriculum.

- 1. We began several years ago to teach a course in English Literature and Composition. This course could be used to meet the two-semester 12th grade English requirement and prepare the students to take the AP exam. This course, taught by Mrs. Emily Boersen, is now registered as an official Advanced Placement course. Successful scores on this exam can be used to earn college credit.
- 2. Two years ago, we added an Advance Placement course in Statistics. This course allows us to meet the needs of students who desire to continue their math studies in an area practical to further work in business and industry.

- 3. To assist our students who continue on in school in the area of engineering and computer science, we started a course in Computer Programming. Mr. Matt Elzinga has been teaching this course for the past two years.
- 4. This past year, we dropped the requirement for all students to take Computer Applications. This decision was based on the fact that our students are getting good exposure to work with the computer and the need to focus entirely on the Microsoft Office package was not always helpful to students. This course will still be offered as an elective.
- 5. Last spring, we made the decision to make significant changes in our Religion curriculum. We have dropped the requirement for 9th grade students to take Cults and Non-Christian Religions. We believe that many of the concepts of this course are being covered in other courses. We hope to offer this as an elective to 12th grade students in a few years. We will be adding a semester of Church History giving students four total semesters. There will be two semesters in 10th grade, Ancient and Medieval Church History, and two semesters in 11th grade which would be Modern and Reformed Church History. In addition to these required courses in Church History, one semester of New Testament Survey for 9th grade and one semester of Worldviews for 12th grade will be required. This change will take us three years to complete as the students work their way through the classes.
- 6. Several years ago we added a course called Global Issues to our Social Studies department. This class was designed to help students investigate the historical causes of many of the issues that we face in our world today and consider the Reformed perspective of these issues.

Development of the school curriculum will continue to take place as we consider the needs of our students given the changing world that we live in. Some courses may become irrelevant because of changes around us and other courses may need to be developed to meet new needs. Guiding every decision will be concern for the development of the student so that with body, mind, and soul he will be well equipped to serve God wherever God places him. As a School Board, Administration, and Faculty we prayerfully seek God's guidance as we make important decisions in the area of curriculum.

Investment in SAT Preparation Reaps Strong Results

The best preparation for the SAT is a challenging high school curriculum. Therefore, SAT preparation begins in the classroom. However, it is not wise to take the SAT without doing some specific preparation for the test. Our students start the process of preparing to take the SAT as 11th graders already during their 9th grade year by taking the PSAT 8/9. The process continues when students in the 10th grade take the PSAT 10. In the fall of the 11th grade year the students have the opportunity to take the PSAT/NMSQT (which also is the qualifying test for the National Merit Scholarship) and then finally in the spring of 11th grade the students take the SAT.

To specifically prepare for the SAT the students can access the Test Prep booklets that are available in the Guidance Office. These booklets can be beneficial and serve their purpose. There are test taking tips and full practice tests available in them. That being said, the best way the students can prepare for the SAT is by taking full advantage of Khan Academy and what it offers. Khan Academy is a FREE online test prep website that works hand in hand with the College Board (the company that administers the PSAT and SAT tests) to provide the students top notch test preparation.

Starting in 10th grade, Mrs. Bergman helps each of our students set up a Khan Academy account and a College Board account online. She also helps each student "link" the two accounts together so that they share information. The benefit of this is that Khan Academy then has access to each student's PSAT 8/9 and PSAT 10 results and customizes a test preparation program for each student based on the results of those tests and what areas need to be worked on. This customization helps each student use their time wisely and focus specifically on the areas that need the most attention. Mrs. Bergman meets individually with each student during their 10th grade year and 11th grade year to show them how to use Khan Academy and make the most of the website's resources.



For the students who choose to use Khan Academy and make an intentional effort to do so we have seen great results. We have had students who have answered over 500 questions in Khan Academy and seen improvements of over 140 points in their test scores. With these gains in test scores, students are earning for themselves thousands in scholarship money they otherwise wouldn't have gotten. Sadly, the problem is that many of our students choose not to use Khan Academy or some choose to use it for an hour or two and expect results which simply aren't going to happen. So, please encourage your son or daughter to use Khan Academy consistently and intentionally.


Upper Level Courses for Seniors

Once students advance into their Senior year, many of them look forward to the challenge of taking one or more of our advanced level courses. These are courses that will take what the student has learned in their classes in the lower grades and apply it at a higher level. These rigorous classes will help students be more prepared in specific areas of study and thus help them make the transition to college level work.



In the Mathematics Department and the English Department we offer Advanced Placement courses. The Advance Placement program allows well prepared students to pursue college level work while still in high school. This program is run by a company called College Board. They supply a detailed set of expectations about what content a college-level course in that subject should cover and then allow the AP teachers to design their own course with these standards in mind. They review each course design through a process called the AP Course Audit before authorizing your school to call the course "AP." When students take these courses they can demonstrate to the colleges that they have adequately learned the material by taking the AP Exam. Performing well on the AP Exam not only shows that they have mastered the material but most colleges and universities will accept the exam scores for credit. We currently offer AP courses in English Literature and Composition and also Statistics.

Several of our academic departments have classes that are very challenging. In the Mathematics Department, Seniors are able to choose between the Advanced Placement Statistics and Pre-Calculus. This decision is



generally based upon the direction that the student will pursue in college, although there are a few students who will take both of these courses. The Science Department has three courses that are offered to Seniors. Advanced Biology goes into great depth in several areas of study including biotechnology, environmental studies. genetics. Anatomy and Physiology is generally seen as a good preparation for going into studies in any medical field. Physics covers many topics useful for engineering and other mechanical or technological areas of study. These science courses not only teach content that is at an advanced level but they also give instruction in the use of laboratory equipment and processes. The Social Studies Department offers a course called Global Issues. This course examines the historical

roots of many problems that affect people throughout the world today. These studies are done using the "spectacles of scripture" so that the students gain an understanding of how these things are used by God in His providential rule of all things.

We are thankful that we have students who are interested in pursuing learning at this level and that we have faculty who are interested and capable of teaching these classes. As in all of our work, we are hopeful that these courses impress upon the student the power and divinity of God as seen in His creation and His providential rule so that each student may become better equipped to serve the Creator throughout the rest of his or her life.

Dual Enrollment

As students across the country begin planning for next year's courses, many are considering dual-enrollment (also known as concurrent enrollment) classes. Dual enrollment classes enable high school students to take classes at a local college and then with a passing grade earn possible college credit.

College Credit



There are several reasons why high school students should work with their parents and school to participate in dual enrollment programs.

These benefits include:

- 1. Getting a jump start on college graduation by earning college credit while still in high school and starting off college with earned credits.
- 2. Learning what it takes to achieve success with college level courses so that when the student gets to college they are prepared.
- 3. Most of the time the tuition for the class is paid for by the state of Michigan and therefore free to our students.
- 4. Students are able to take classes that are not offered at CCHS.

You might be thinking, this sounds fantastic, why wouldn't all students take dual enrollment classes but there can be some drawbacks to taking dual enrollment classes.

These drawbacks include:

- 1. Taking dual enrollment classes that are taken on campus often require students to miss out on time at CCHS thus taking away from the overall high school experience.
- 2. Some students find out they are not ready to take college level classes.
- 3. Students who are actively involved with extra-curricular activities or work outside of school might find out they don't have time for everything.
- 4. Students must make sure the classes they are taking at one college will be accepted by the school they intend to earn their degree from.
